

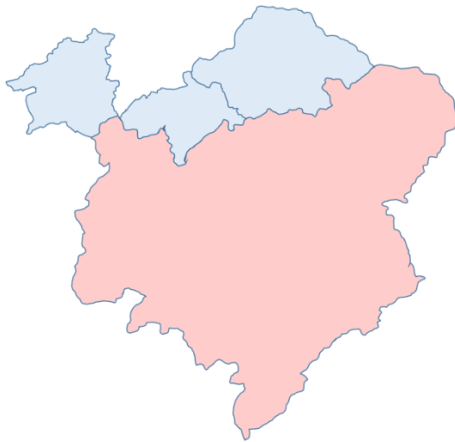

Lorna has seen much change to the police over these years and was an integral part of not only the police in Tweeddale, but also the community. She is heavily involved in the Beltane festival and Highland Games, and we wish her well for the future.

Events season in the North CPA is finally over, with Lauder having their common riding at the beginning of August. There will still be some events to come (such as the Peebles Arrow – see image) but our busy period is now over and we can focus more on local community matters. One issue that is rising again is acquisitive crime.

Please can I encourage people to take precaution with their belongings; whether that is locking sheds with suitably strong locks, ensuring their house doors are locked, closing windows, hiding car keys and valuables, not leaving tools in vans, fit trackers to quad bikes etc. Simple actions can help prevent crime. I have attached some guidance to this e-mail, please share widely.

If you see something suspicious please call the police. If it is a suspicious vehicle you are not sure of call 101, if you see someone climbing through a window call 999. Whichever number you call, we will grade the priority and attend. Sign up for Rural Watch Scotland for alerts on current crime trends and other information.

Protecting most vulnerable

In July 2024 Police in the Scottish Borders attended and were involved with around 197 mental health related calls, around 14 missing person enquiries and approximately 90 domestic related incidents.

Tweeddale East and West had 16 mental health related calls 4 missing person enquiries. Due to GDPR and protection of victims/subjects involved, we are unable to share any more specific information in relation to these type of call within this report.

Police Scotland work in collaboration with key partners to assist the most vulnerable within the communities and to provide support.



Reducing Violence and Anti-Social Behaviour

Assaults

Anti-Social Behaviour

01/07/24 – report of screaming coming from the grounds of Halyrude School, Peebles. Not noise on officers attending – youths spoken to and this had been youths shouting at each other.

07/07/24 – report a disturbance at Glentress. Officers attended and a group of friends had fallen out.

07/07/24 – report of youths drinking and urinating in March Street, Peebles. Due to this being a busy area and no further calls being received no officers attended.

11/07/24 – report of disturbance in Northgate, Peebles. Male was traced no criminality.

12/07/24 – report of youths on the roof of the pavilion on Tweed Green. Officers attended and youths no longer on roof, alcohol was seized from some, but generally the youths engaged with officers.

12/07/24 – report of screaming and shouting coming from the area at Gytes/Whitestone Park. Officers attended and found no trace of anyone.

18/07/24 – report of youths causing a nuisance in Hall Street, Innerleithen.

25/07/24 – report of a male causing a disturbance in Northgate, Peebles, officers attended, and the male has been reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

25/07/24 – report of eggs being thrown at properties in Leithen Road, Innerleithen.

27/07/24 – report of youths drinking on Tweed Green, Peebles. No trace on officers attending.

Vandalism

07/07/24 – report of youths setting fire to a bin in Hall Street, Innerleithen. Enquiries are continuing to trace youths involved.

17/07/24 – report of a wing mirror being damaged on a vehicle while it was parked on High Street, Innerleithen.

25/07/24 – Report of damage to a window at a property in Pirn Road, Innerleithen.



Reducing Acquisitive Crime

Theft by Housebreaking

Improving Road Safety

Road Traffic Offences

16/07/24 – a driver was issued with a Fixed Penalty Ticket for careless driving in Clovenfords.

28/07/24 – a driver was issued with a fine and penalty points for driving with a tyre where the ply/cord was exposed in Innerleithen.

Tackling Serious and Organised Crime

Serious and organised crime enforcement – July 2024

The Scottish Borders CID Proactive Unit executed 2 Drug Warrants across the command area during July, all were positive. This included another large industrial scale Cannabis cultivation which had a potential street value of £190,000. Furthermore the Unit conducted 4 proactive searches resulting in 1 person being charged, £50,000 of controlled drugs and weapons being recovered.

They would also like to highlight that the local communities across the Borders may have information which they deem insignificant in relation to people being seen at disused large premises over a period of time. Any suspicious activity will be followed up by this team but it is important that the public know they can report such matters in person at any Police Station, by use of 101 or anonymously via the Crime Stoppers charity.

Campaigns

Keep Safe Initiative

Primarily aimed at disabled members of the community helping to tackle disability hate crime, Keep Safe is a national network of over 800 safe places (including shops, libraries, pubs etc.) for anyone who may feel lost, scared or vulnerable when out in the community. During the July the SBCAT has been heavily involved with the election detail and local events in St Boswells, Lauder, Duns and elsewhere in the Borders.



ROAD SAFETY – SBCAT have continued carrying out road checks in numerous locations in the Scottish Borders and have issued 1 traffic ticket for careless driving this month.

On 31st July the SBCAT were in Lauder when there was a serious vehicle accident 1 mile North on the A68, involving a vehicle containing 3 children. The CAT attended immediately and assisted the drivers and young children who were in shock until traffic officers could attend and take over.

PARKING TICKETS – Officers have been carrying out high visibility enforcement across the Borders and addressing parking concerns there. Advice has been given to drivers and 29 tickets have been issued.

Passing attention was given to Galashiels, Jedburgh, Kelso and along with other areas.

RURAL ACQUISITIVE CRIME – We continue to carry out static road checks in rural areas at all times of day to deter and detect rural acquisitive crime. 2 static checks were carried out throughout the Scottish Borders this month along with numerous hi-visibility patrols of rural areas.

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR – High visibility patrols have continued in targeted areas of the Scottish Borders to address concerns highlighted at these locations. The SBCAT has also been heavily involved in Community events throughout the month. Much of this has involved foot patrols targeting anti-social behaviour.

On 4th July the SBCAT were tasked with patrols of the polling stations. We dealt with some banners which had been stolen, including one which had been modified to be mildly offensive and placed outside of a polling station.

The SBCAT were St Boswells Fair for several days. There was a lot of engagement with the local community and the travellers with no major issues or problems.

On 24th July SBCAT traced and arrested a male wanted by the CID for robbery.

The SBCAT have been attending in Jedburgh on Mondays when the court is on due to reports of ASB. These mobile and foot patrols have been well received by the public in Jedburgh with officers being approached and thanked on several occasions. These patrols will continue over the summer months.

2 youth warning letters were issued during the month of June.

PROTECTING VULNERABLE PEOPLE – Part of the SBCAT role is to trace persons wanted on warrant/missing person/and bail curfew checks. SBCAT have carried out regular checks on multiple individuals who are wanted on warrant with

only 1 arrest this month for a non-domestic offence. The SBCAT has also assisted with high-risk domestic enquiry packs.

One of the roles the SBCAT completes is issuing dog fouling tickets on behalf of the council. On 29th July officers attended at an address in Galashiels to issue such a ticket. Upon meeting the male due to receive the ticket officers became concerned about his ability to care for himself and the dog. The following day they did a joint visit with the SSPCA. The dog was handed over to the SSPCA and it established that several members of the family had mental health issues and their home was in a poor state with some basic facilities not working. Full details were noted and passed to social work to ensure the family get the support they require.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT – SBCAT officers have taken part in 1 one drugs search warrants in the Scottish Borders. 3 people have been searched under the Misuse of Drugs Act with 1 of them being found in possession of a personal amount of cannabis.

For the past month the SBCAT has been enquiring into a package of drugs which was intercepted by the Post Office. Subsequently a search warrant was craved and executed in Hawick on 30th of July. A personal amount of cannabis and unknown tablets were recovered. Further forensic analysis is required but it is highly likely that the male involved with be reported for being concerned in the supply of controlled drugs.

OTHER ISSUES OF NOTE- Despite extra patrols in the Burnfoot and Mainsfield Road areas of Hawick there has been an increase in ASB, including the use of off road motor bikes and electric bikes. During August there will be a significant focus on these issues by the CAT and other Community Officers.
